

About the GPRA Interview

GPRA stands for **G**overnment **P**erformance and **R**esults **A**ct. It is an interview-style survey designed to track your progress. It is part of a grant program through which you are receiving services. Everyone that receives a service paid for by the grant is asked to participate in three GPRA interviews.



Q: Why have I been asked to complete a GPRA interview?

Wisconsin received a federal grant to support people who may need substance use and/or mental health services. A requirement of the grant is to complete GPRA interviews. **This will help Wisconsin to continue to receive funding to provide these services in your community.**



Q: What types of questions are in the interview?

The GPRA covers many topics, including **substance use history, mental health and physical needs, relationships and family support, living conditions, education and employment, and recovery support.** Some of the questions are sensitive. **You may skip or decline any question in the interview.**



Q: What will I be asked to do?

You will be asked to complete **three GPRA interviews** when


1. You begin services paid for by this grant (intake interview)
2. You stop services paid for by this grant (discharge interview)
3. Six months after your first GPRA interview (follow-up interview)

The interviews take around 30 minutes.



Q: Why should I do a follow-up interview?

You'll receive a **gift card** as a thank you for your time! The follow-up interviews help track your progress and growth over time. It can also help build a stronger relationship with your treatment team and identify other supports that your team can provide. Finally, it will help Wisconsin to continue to receive funding to offer these services in your community.



Q: What happens with my interview answers?

Your responses are securely sent to the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute where they are then sent to the national funder. Your interviews are linked with an ID number, not your name. The responses will also be shared with the Division of Care and Treatment Services at the Wisconsin Department of Health Services. **The purpose is to look at everyone's progress together across Wisconsin and the U.S, not individual interviews.**
